New and Challenging, but Fun, Rewarding and Horizon-broadening – My Main Roles and Duties

Public Information, External Relations Division, International Organization for Migration Mission to Sri Lanka

I am attached with the External Relations Division and work directly under the supervision of Chief of Mission and the guidance of the Programme Analyst. My main job is to handle the Public Information work. Since the unit is a supporting unit, I am also required to support other functional units' work if necessary. Below are some of my routine work.

- Managed public information work
- Coordination with United Nations Resident Coordinator Office, event coverage, publications production, online advertisement campaign, social media and website updates, public information and social media guidelines monitoring etc.
- Represented IOM in meetings, for example UN communication group and embassies
- Presented in a guest lecture in a public training institute, discussing the topic "Migration Myths vs Reality"
- Others: Meetings with Senior Management Team, verbal Mandarin-English translation, assistance in projects of other units, new year promotional items handling etc.

Support for Regional Labour Migration (LMR) Unit

Later on, I was also assigned by our Chief of Mission to assist the Regional Labour Migration (LMR) Unit from mid-October to end of November. Our LMR unit mainly work on a 4-year project named Colombo Process (CP) which is a Regional Consultative Process on the management of overseas employment and contractual labour for countries of origins in Asia.

A Regional Workshop for Labour Attachés of the Colombo Process Member States was going to be held in early December, thus I assisted on some logistics (flight itineraries and accommodation arrangement), visuals production (banner and folder cover), regional coordination and communication etc.



Making the most out of the experience – My project in IOM

During September, I was humbly given an opportunity by our Chief of Mission to lead a project with the support from my unit – organizing the Global Migration Film Festival 2018 Sri Lanka. I had a mixed feeling at that time, happy that I am appreciated, excited for the project, but also more worried as I am not sure if I am capable to take the project on. At last, under the encouragement from my supervisor, I accepted the challenge and started to manage the event. From the event concept to the implementation, I have to take care of every part of it meanwhile taking my colleagues opinion into account. The process was really long and difficult. Nonetheless, I got to learn much more on how work in an organization, especially in a multi-cultural environment. Team management, EQ ability, diplomatic skills, project management, external relationship management, and presentation skills etc. I have learnt all these when I was managing the project. Impacting the Local Community

Awareness raising and correct information delivering to help people make informed migration decision is the main impact that I have created throughout the assignment. In Sri Lanka, many people consider migration to other developed countries a good way to seek for a better life. Popular destinations include Australia, Canada and Italy etc. However, not all people are qualified for the visa application. Some would then take risk by migrating irregularly. Many cases end up being trafficked to elsewhere and are not able to return back to Sri Lanka; some may end up being exploited. Hence, a very crucial component of IOM's work is to deliver a correct migration concept.

Through organizing different events and using social media, people could obtain correct information regarding migration. From time to time, I help answer the Facebook inbox inquiries. People mainly enquire our assistance in migration to Australia programme and the medical clearance for visa application. Though these are not very significant help, I am still happy that I can be here to solve their problems. On top of the above, I also gave a lecture with our Chief of Mission, Giuseppe Crocetti and my supervisor, Nisansala Gunarathne, our Programme Analyst, discussing the topic – Migration Myths VS Reality in Bandaranaike International Diplomatic Training Institute (BIDTI) to the students in International studies. The main idea of our lecture is to explode the myths and convey accurate information. We believe regular migration is beneficial to both host and receiving countries if it is used in a correct way. Migration is not a problem to be solved; it's a reality to be managed. Through using statistics and evidence-based research, the students there are able to learn more about the crisis and migration knowledge. They could also know more about IOM's work and position in migration.

I would say my work in Sri Lanka was much heavier than I expected. Before I left for the assignment, our Hong Kong buddies who work there before told us that they managed to maintain work-life balance and the working style there is more relaxing than that in Hong Kong.
